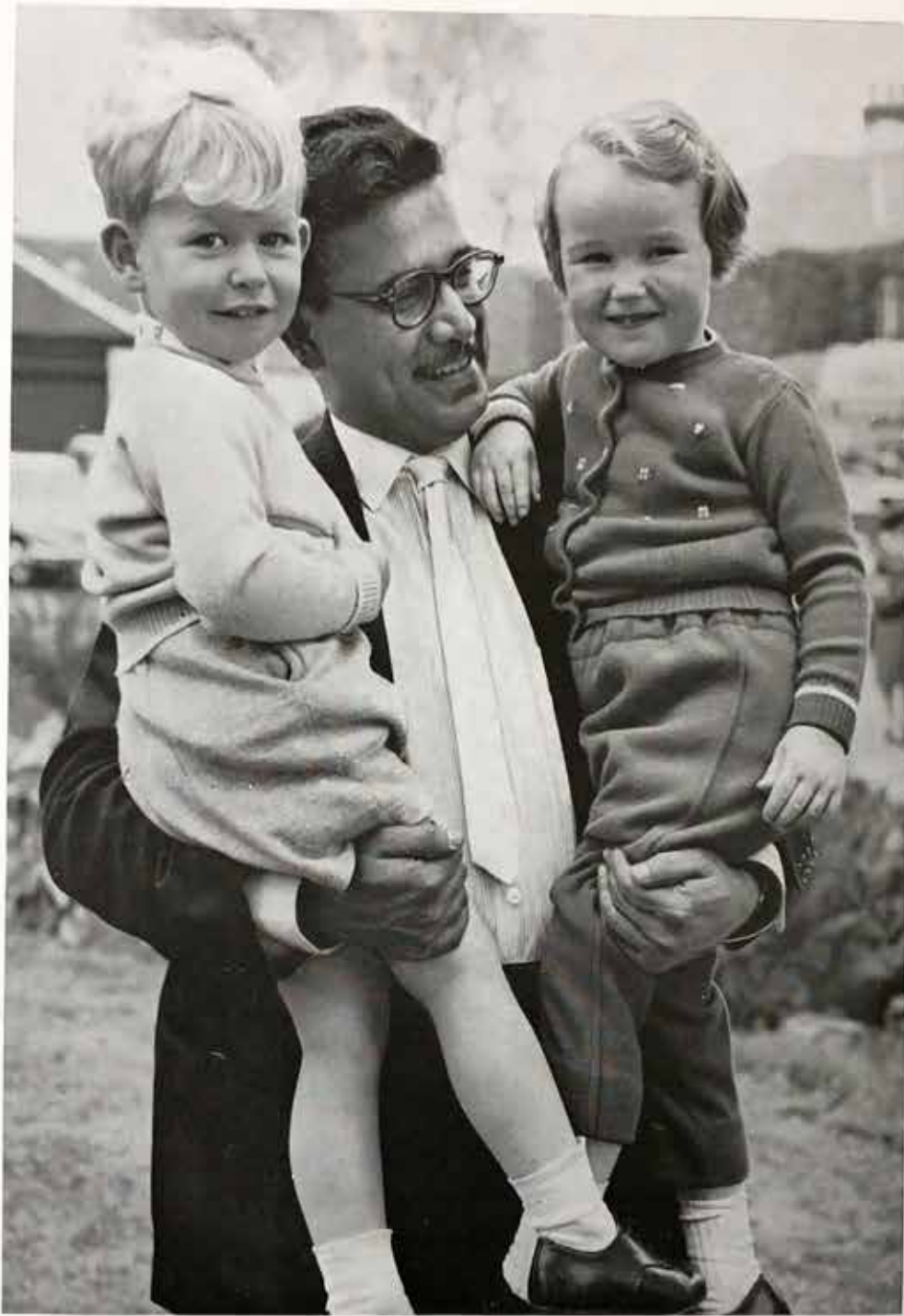

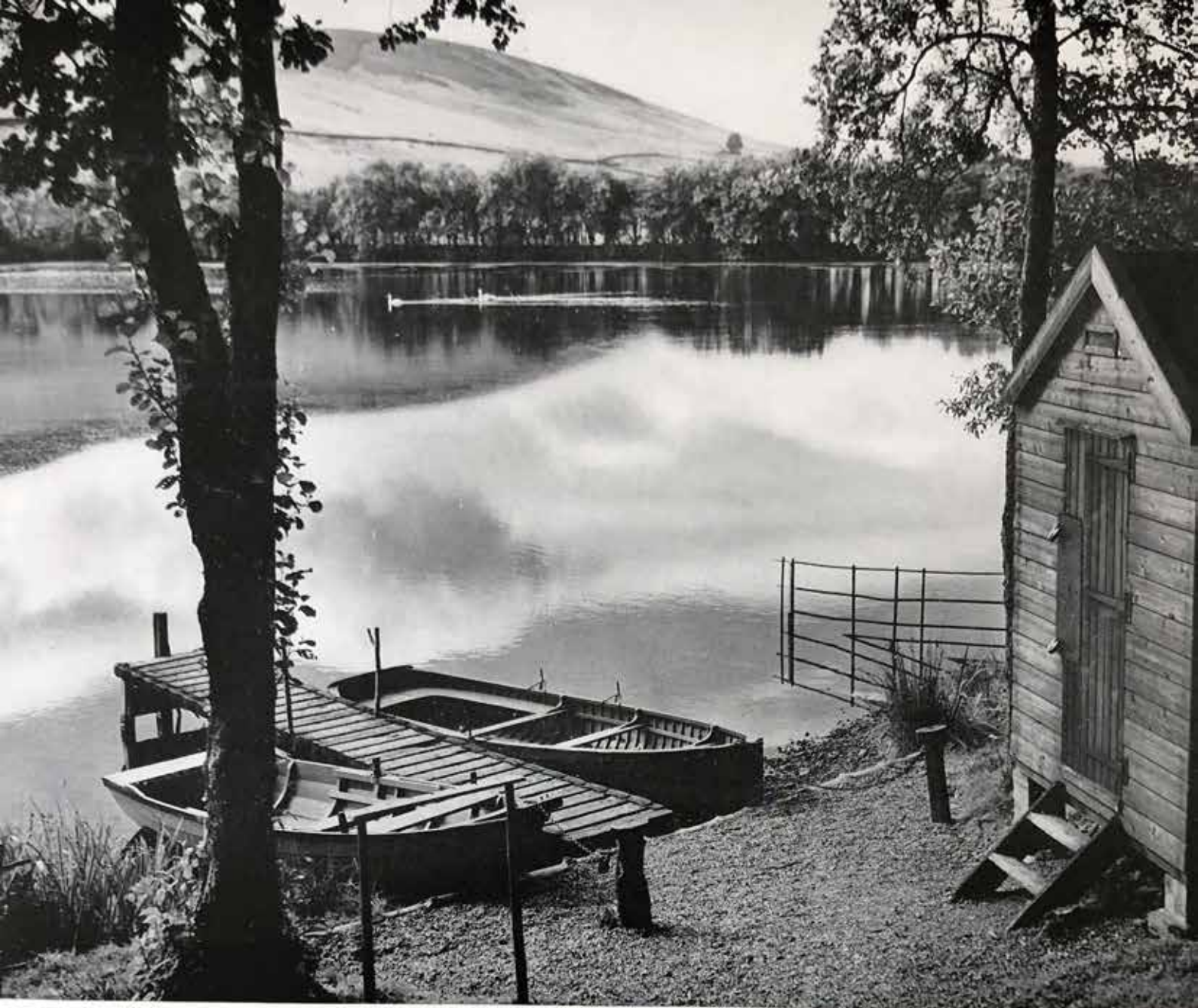

ANNUAL STAFF DANCE

We had, of course, been supplying farm bottled Tuberculin Tested Milk to Messrs. Richmond since August, 1960, and the change in so far as customers were concerned merely involved the introduction of our Certified supplies and our own delivery services.

We welcome this opportunity to extend our retail business to Ayr and district, and it will be our aim to continue the excellent service provided by 'Knockdon' over so many years.

He canna rise much higher.*

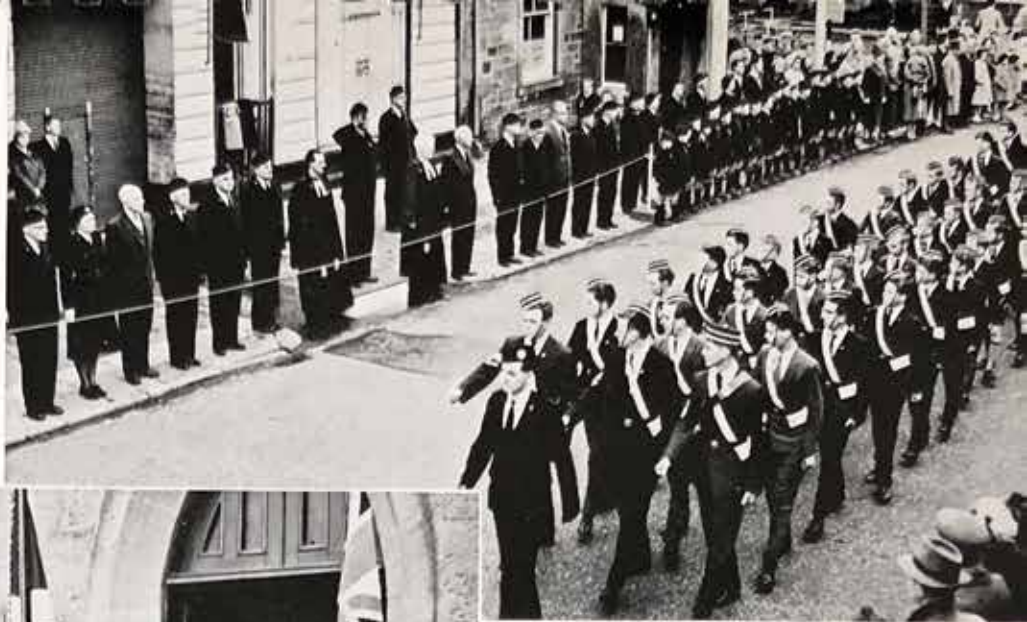
*Weel noo, the Staff, jist look yerse',

Auchinleck On the Air

The visit of the B.B.C. Outside Broadcast (Television) Unit to Auchinleck was in two phases. On Sunday morning, 23rd September, the Boys' Brigade Church Parade and Service, for Officers attending the West Lowland Area Conference, together with the local B.B. Company celebrating its 21st Anniversary, was recorded in Barony Church. In the evening a large

congregation with combined local Choirs, conducted by Mr. James Yates, and with two local soloists, Miss Rae Conn and Dr. Rigg, recorded a "Songs of Praise" programme, introduced by Murdoch McPherson. The Parade Service was broadcast on 30th September and "Songs of Praise" on 4th November.

Letters of appreciation were still arriving in Auchinleck when the note of congratulation turned to one of sympathy. The closure of Barony Colliery, principle source of employment for the district, was a major disaster which affected the livelihood of 1,200 men and their families—many of whom had taken part in the events recorded by the B.B.C.

At the time of writing the future of the Colliery has not been determined by the National Coal Board.

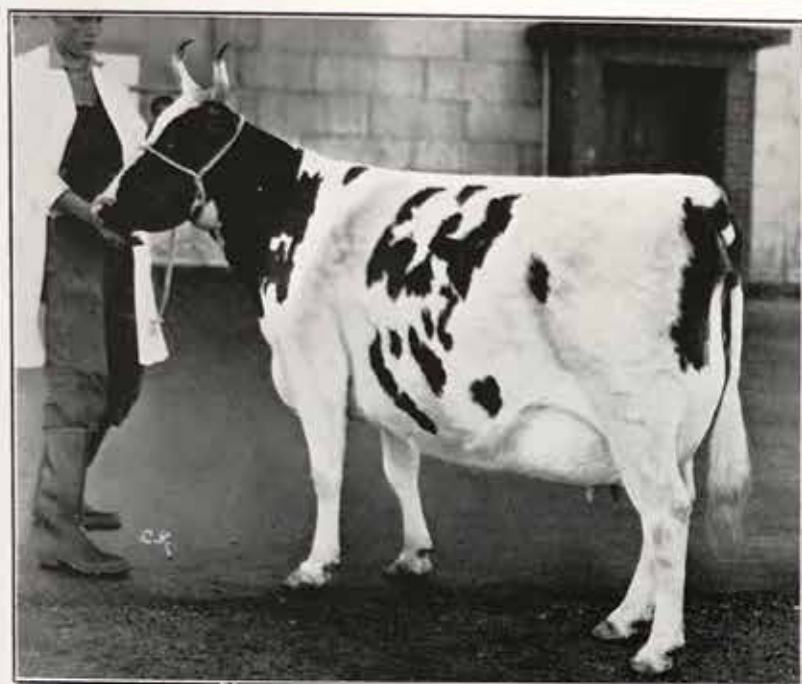

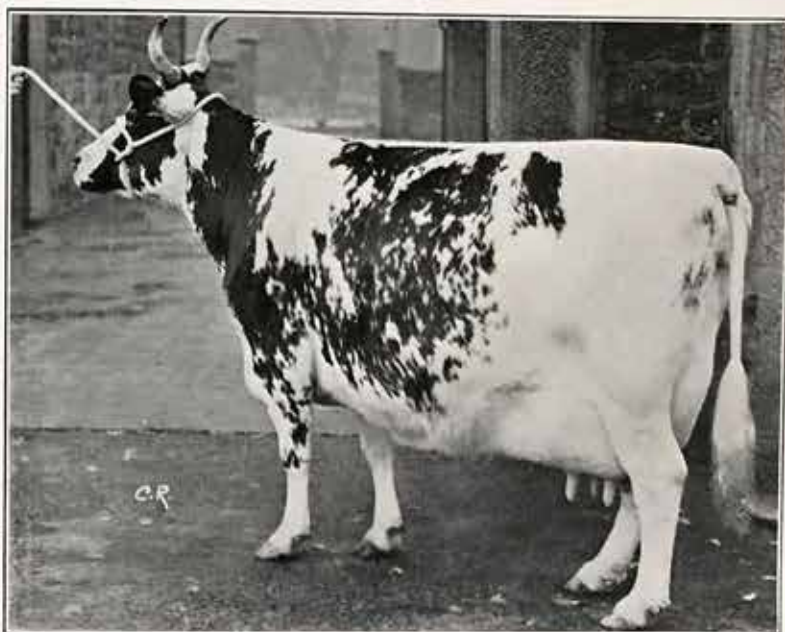
