Advance planning

Best times of year to visit.

Weather is never reliable in Scotland. Even in the height of summer you may need a jacket. In June, July (in the weeks around the summer solstice on 21st June with sunrise at 4.34am and sunset at 10.05pm) there is daylight till after 10pm and it never gets totally dark at this time of year. You will be wakened early by birdsong!

In winter (around December solstice 21 December sun sets around 4pm) there is less daylight and it can be cold, icy or wet. So April - October is probably best for visits.

Wednesday is a traditional traders' holiday, so many of the smaller shops are shut at least in the afternoon, if not all day. Probably best to aim for a visit Thursday – Tuesday.

Note: Cumnock in the parish of old Cumnock is a different town to New Cumnock in the neighbouring parish of New Cumnock. It can be confusing!

Nearest airport is Glasgow Prestwick (PIK), then Glasgow (GLA) but you are most likely going to arrive at Edinburgh (EDI) as there are more flights to there.

Cumnock Heritage Centre is a privately run museum open on Friday afternoons and there are open days on the second and last Sundays of each month and at other times. It houses farm and service vehicles, steam engines, farm equipment, a police station, lots of transport related material, photos, books, local history, Mauchline ware and Cumnock pottery. Well worth a visit. Run by volunteers.
